INSTRUCTIONS FOR APPENDIX B

(Consumer Bankruptcy Matters Handled by Applicant)

Please Review These Instructions and the Attached Sample Pages Carefully Before Completing Appendix B.

Per the American Board of Certification's Rules and Regulations: https://www.abcworld.org/rules

Section 3.1.3 (a):

- (a) **Bankruptcy Law**. The applicant must make a satisfactory showing of experience through substantial involvement in the practice, arbitration or mediation of bankruptcy law. Substantial involvement shall mean both (1) that the applicant has devoted a minimum of thirty percent of practice time to bankruptcy law during each of the three years immediately preceding the date of the Long Form Application, and
- (2) that the applicant has devoted a minimum of 400 hours to the practice of bankruptcy law during each of the three years immediately preceding the date of the Long Form Application.

In addition, the applicant must satisfy one of the following requirements:

- (1) Applicants seeking certification in Consumer Bankruptcy Law must have substantially participated in <u>at least thirty adversary proceedings or contested matters</u> (as defined in Federal Rules of Bankruptcy Procedure 7001 and 9014) in cases involving individual debtors, with no more than five of any such matters being of a single type.
- (2) Applicants seeking certification in Business Bankruptcy Law must have substantially participated in at least thirty adversary proceedings or contested matters (as defined in Federal Rules of Bankruptcy Procedure 7001 and 9014) in cases where the debtor had been engaged in business prior to filing a petition in bankruptcy, with no more than three of any such matters being of a single type.

Substantial involvement is not necessarily limited to court appearances, but may include briefing, argument, interrogation of witnesses, negotiation of settlements or workouts, or drafting. The activity must relate to an adversary proceeding or contested matter and must have been substantial in relation to the total efforts devoted to the adversary preceding or contested matter. The substantial involvement requirements shall be applied to all applicants, including but not limited to private practitioners, government lawyers, professors of law, United States Trustees, Bankruptcy Administrators, Assistant United States Trustees, or Trial Attorneys for United States Trustees; but shall be waived for an applicant who has served as a full-time judge (but not as a magistrate judge, administrative law judge, commissioner or special master) of a federal court during at least three of the five years immediately preceding the application. Service as a professor of law does not constitute the practice of law for the purposes of this sub-section.

A. "Matter Type".

- 1. <u>Meaning of "Matter Type"</u>. A "Matter Type" is a type of adversary proceeding under Rule 7001 (<u>e.g.</u>, a turnover action) or a contested matter under Rule 9014 (<u>e.g.</u>, objection to confirmation of plan.)
- 2. <u>Multiple Matters of Same Type</u>. If your Appendix B includes more than one matter of the same type (e.g., five nondischargeability actions or two objections to claims), all such matters of the same type should be entered in sequence. Remember that a total of 30 consumer bankruptcy matters is required, and that no more than five matters of the same type may be counted to satisfy this requirement.
- 3. <u>Single Matters of a Particular Type</u>. If your Appendix B includes only one matter of any particular type (<u>e.g.</u>, only one preference action or only one motion for relief from stay), each such matter must be submitted on a separate page of Appendix B.

B. "Nature of Matter".

1. <u>Specific Nature of Adversary Proceeding or Contested Matter</u>. Please describe with particularity the specific consumer matter type (e.g., action for avoidance of lien or motion for relief from stay).

C. "Your Involvement".

- 1. <u>Substantial Involvement in the Matter</u>. Please indicate in reasonable detail why your involvement was substantial relative to this particular matter.
- 2. <u>Different Kinds of Activity</u>. Remember that substantial involvement is not limited to court appearances, but may include briefing, argument, interrogation of witnesses, negotiations of settlements or workouts, or drafting.

D. "Why This is a 'Consumer' Matter".

- 1. <u>Individual Consumer Debtors</u>. The <u>debtor</u> must be an individual consumer debtor (under Chapters 7, 12 and 13 only) for the matter to qualify as a "consumer matter".
- 2. <u>Consumer Debt</u>. Please describe why the specific matter relates primarily to "consumer debt", that is, debt incurred primarily for personal, family or household purposes, not business purposes.
